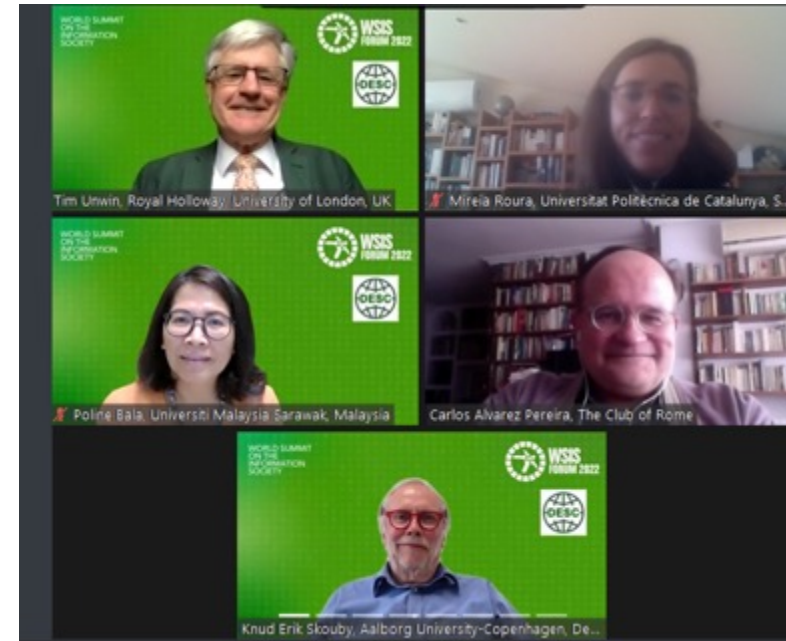

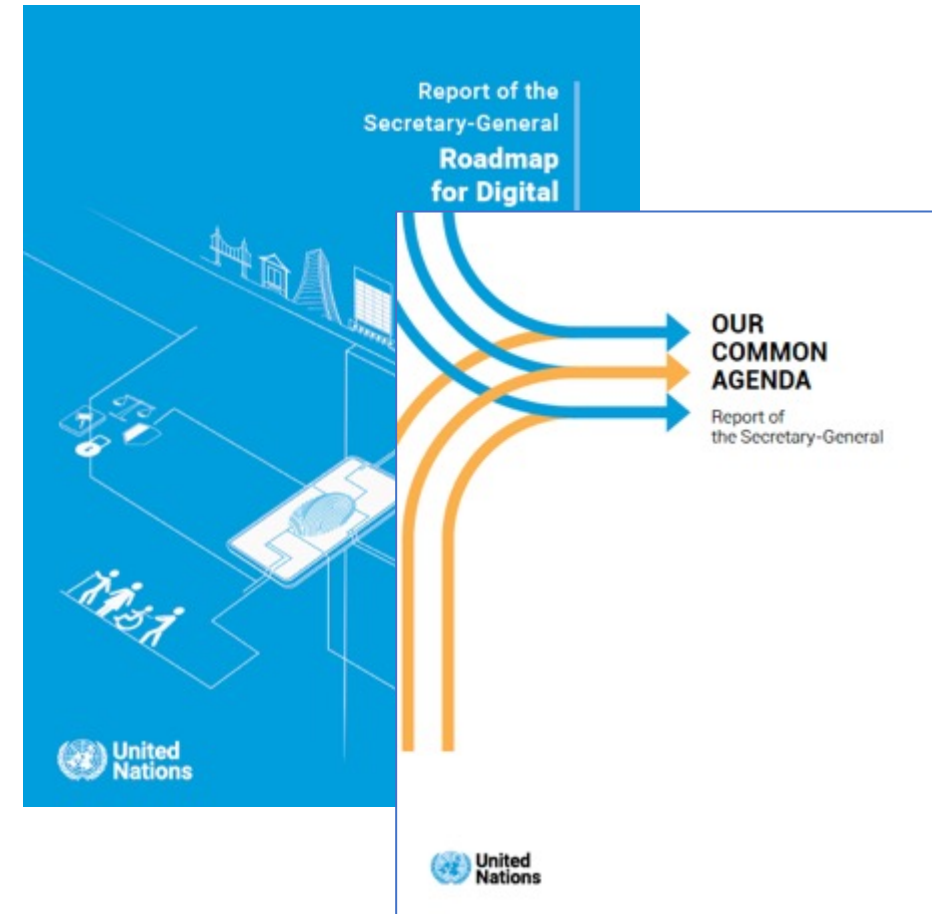

# Reflections on WSIS, the UN system and the SDGs

- WSIS has played a key role in bringing UN agencies and other stakeholders together to share new developments in ICT4D
- But how many times do the UN SG's *Roadmap for digital cooperation* or *Our Common Agenda* mention WSIS?
- Proliferation of other platforms and processes
  - Duplication, overlap, reinventing the wheel...
  - Need for substantial change within the UN system



# Only 8 years to 2030

- Now is the time to start planning for post-Agenda 2030 and beyond the SDGs
- Being realistic, most SDGs targets are not going to be delivered
- What structure do we want and how will progress be measured?
  - WSIS could play a role in shaping this
- We need a new agenda for the UN
  - Focusing more on reducing inequalities than on growth
  - And delivering a new approach to the environment

# The Value of the WSIS process for academics

- An opportunity to learn about new developments in the field
- Chance to showcase applied relevance of their research
- Contributing to policy discussions and impact
- Building multi-sector networks
- Linking to other ITU activities (such as Study Groups, Telecom World, Kaleidoscope) and wider UN system
  - But need to avoid duplication

# SDGs: Interface between digital and the environment is the most crucial challenge

- Most research and practice focuses on climate change and the use of digital tech to reduce carbon emissions
- Yet digital tech also has hugely damaging impacts on the environment
  - Energy requirements
  - Environmental impact on space
  - Anti-sustainable business models
  - Environmental destruction and e-waste
  - Cultural landscape destruction
- We must change our ways of thinking



# The Digital-Environment System Coalition (DESC)

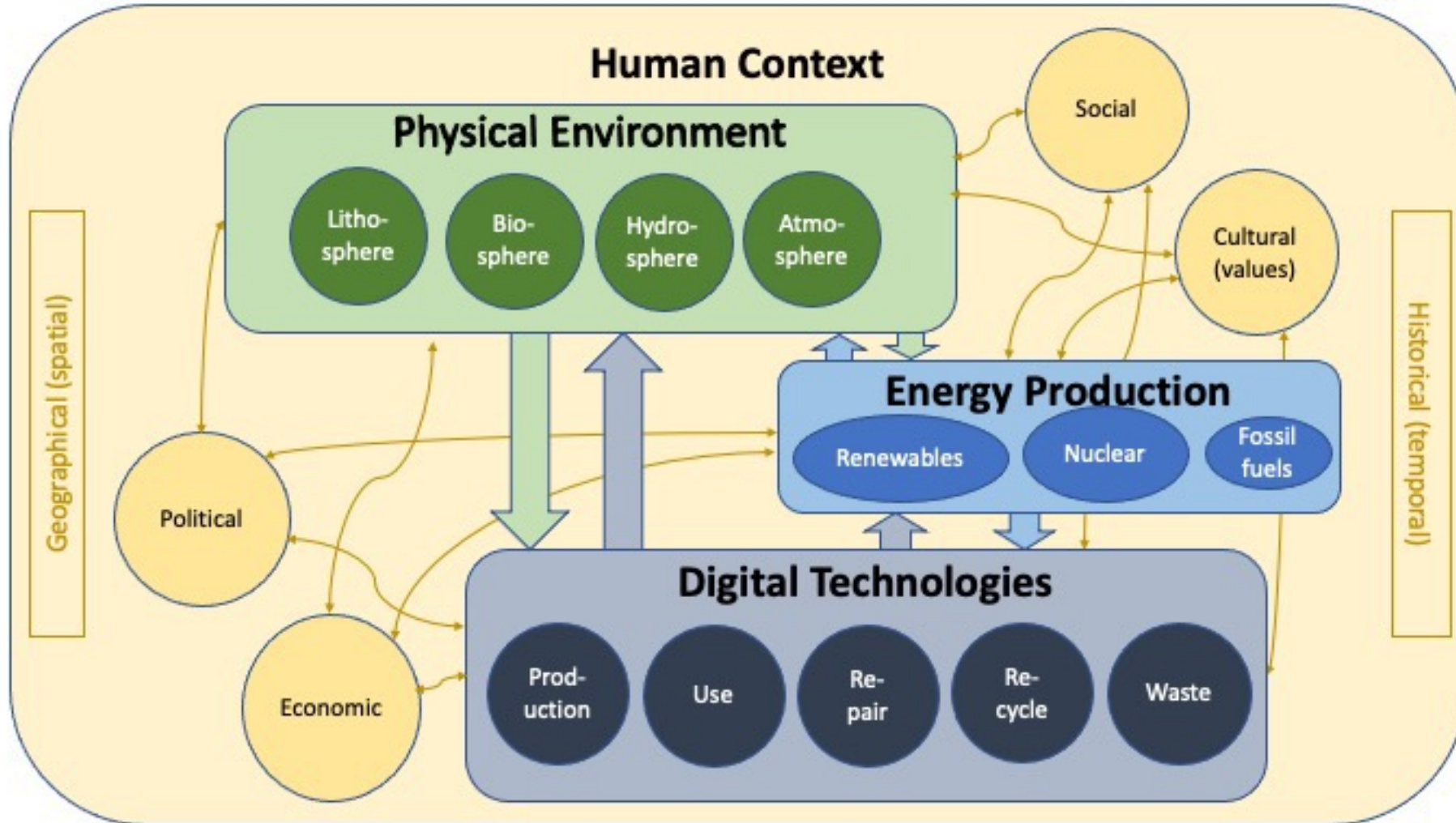
- Aim: to develop a more holistic understanding of the interactions between digital tech and the physical environment
- Need to create new models to address the balance between positive and harmful environmental impact of digital tech
- Academic research shaping global policy and practice

- Working Groups: research, practice and policy
- Strong governance framework and ethical guidelines
